



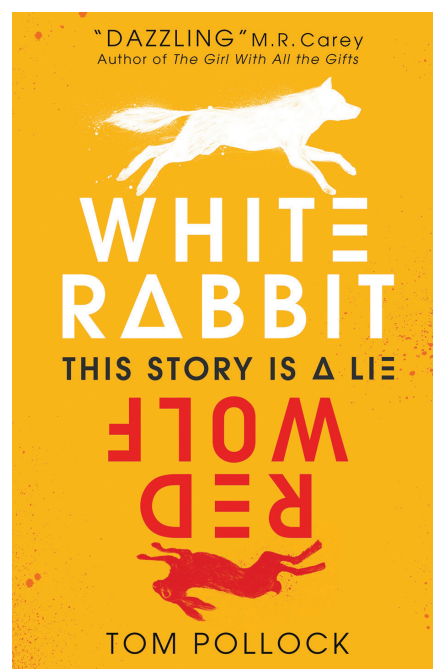

- Pete starts to question his memory as he investigates what is happening to his memory. Do you think you can trust his account by the end of the book?
